Time Management Story Scripts Optional Opener: Help students get a better idea of how long a minute is. Ask students to close their eyes or put their heads down. Tell them to raise a hand when they think one minute has passed. When you see one minute has really passed, ask everyone to look up. Discuss how a minute can seem really long Tell your students a story about time management with these three story scripts. As you read the stories (or have a student read them!), use student volunteers to "act" out the story and color in the sheet (projected or draw on board) to show how time passes. You could also print a copy of the time sheet for each student to color in as you go. After each student's story, ask and discuss "How did this student choose how to spend their time?" (Student A whatever was fun and not boring, Student B - whatever was easy and not hard, Student C - whatever it took to do the job with their best effort) An optional exit ticket is included for students to reflect on their own time spending habits. ©The Responsive Counselor

She worked for 10 minutes before getting bored and then got out her new library book and began reading it. Color in 5 minutes. Oh! Time is up.

- What grade do we think she would earn?
- How did she make choices about how to spend her time? (Focused on fun)
